As the Province, we were happy to commit \$300,000 through the Building Sustainable Communities grant, which helped plant the seed along with the investments the council made as well to bring us to where we are today to this wonderful facility for all to enjoy here in East St. Paul."

Mayor Devlin said team work made the project possible.

"I'd like to take a moment to give special thanks to our staff and especially to our CAO for putting this splash pad together. I know that it's a lot of effort and areas that we're sometimes not familiar with but we persevere and champion them and now we have a fantastic project in front of us that will be in the community for years to come," she

"Thank you to council. We make decisions together and we work well together. It's been a great three years."

And then, an invitation from the Mayor to splash.

"This is a place to cool off and it's a symbol of the kind of community we're building together. One that values play, togetherness and a safe place for all families to gather and enjoy. To all the kids here, I hope your toes stay wet and your smiles stay big all summer long. And to the parents, don't be afraid to get in there, you're never too old to get wet."

ast St. Paul's Chad Posthumus was honoured May 16 with the Winnipeg Sea Bears retiring his No. 33 jersey and the Mayor of the City of Winnipeg designating a section of Donald Street as Honourary Chad Posthumus Way.

Chad passed away in November 2024.

During a ceremony renaming the street, Mayor Scott Gillingham celebrated the Sea Bears star and tireless supporter of youth in our community.

"Chad Posthumus was a remarkable Winnipegger, a fan favourite on the court, and a mentor and role model off it," said Mayor Scott Gillingham. "This street naming is one small way we

can honour the big legacy he left behind."

That same evening before their home opener the Sea Bears retired Chad's jersey.

"Chad's legacy to our team and community speaks for itself," said Sea Bears Owner and Chairman, David Asper. "We're extremely grateful that True North Sports and Entertainment is working with us and supporting how we want to honour Chad. It proves yet again that Canada Life Centre is a treasured community asset, and we look forward to seeing Chad's banner raised as a fitting remembrance to a great Manitoban."

To extend Posthumus' legacy, Sea Bears players will wear a commemorative "33 Forever" patch on their jerseys throughout the 2025 season.

Chad was the Sea Bears first-ever player signing, and played a pivotal role in the Sea Bears'



2023 inaugural season, helping lead the team to a playoff appearance and establishing the foundation of the franchise's identity. He scored the club's first-ever target score winner in a thrilling home opener against the Vancouver Bandits, a moment that instantly became part of Sea Bears history.

In addition to his on-court accomplishments, Chad recently was awarded the King Charles III Coronation Medal, a prestigious national honour recognizing Canadians who have made significant contributions to their communities.

Chad worked to make Winnipeg a better place

by attending many Sea Bears youth camps for underserved children, as well as being a national spokesperson for Diabetes Canada, and attending community events like Pride Week and court openings with community partner Buckets & Borders. Chad was diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes at age 7.

East St. Paul Community Centre General Manager Nancy Plustwa says the Posthumus family, including Chad's parent Charles and Diana, have always been very involved in the centre.

"The apple didn't fall far from the tree," said Plustwa, reflecting on the years of working

Stay safe this summer, be fire safe

the arrival of summer, your fire department would like to provide you with some information to help you enjoy the warm weather ahead.

Fire pits

- A fire pit should be enclosed on all sides and be constructed of masonry, concrete, heavy gauge metal or other non-combustible materi-
- Have a minimum clearance of 3 metres or 10 feet from any structures or combustibles such as decks, fences etc.
- It should be built into the ground, on stone or brick on a flat level surface.
- Avoid building or placing a fire pit under trees, branches, utility wires or overhangs such as roofs.
- Use a non-combustible grate or mesh to cover the fire pit.
- If it has a chimney, ensure it has a mesh or spark arrester installed.
- •**DO NOT USE** portable fire pits such as chimineas or fire pit bowls on a wood or composite deck.
- When in use, the fire pit must be attended at all times by a responsible adult. Make sure the fire is fully extinguished when you are done.
- Do not use a fire pit under windy conditions or during long periods of dry weather. Check with the RM to see if there is a burn ban in effect.
- Do not burn previously painted or treated wood, wet or green/fresh cut wood, yard waste such as grass or leaves, garbage, rubber/plastic or furniture
- Always have a way to put out the fire close to your pit such as a garden hose, bucket of sand or fire extinguisher.
- Ensure the smoke from your fire pit does not impact neighbouring property.
- Keep your fire small in size.
- If your fire gets out of control and starts to

spread to surrounding areas, contact 911 immediately and ask for the fire department.

Fireworks

he sale, storage and use of fireworks within the municipality is governed by a new by-law which was proclaimed in January 2025. By-law is "Fire Prevention and Emergency Response By-Law", BY-LAW #2025-01. There have been some major changes in the new by-law regarding this topic.

- Section 6.5 No person shall display for sale, sell, or offer for sale fireworks within the Municipality.
- Section 6.7 No person shall purchase fireworks, set off, or otherwise ignite any fireworks in or above the Municipality.
- Section 6.8 The Fire Chief or designate may authorize permits for certified personnel to light fireworks during public displays benefiting the community at large as part of special events.

Basically, there is now a ban on all residential fireworks. The changes were made due to safety concerns as residents were not enforcing safety zones that were required, residents were ignoring weather conditions when igniting fireworks such as windy days and dry ground conditions constituting extreme fire hazards and the RM was receiving many complaints regarding the noise from setting off fireworks including the impact on family pets and other animals.

The May 2025 newsletter provides more details regarding the new by-law and ban on all residential fireworks.


